Teenagers want money, and the easiest way to get money is to get a job.

All adolescents either want a job or already have one. Nowadays, jobs are needed more than ever. Everything costs money. Most of the teenagers get jobs just for "pocket change", so that they can just go out, buy CDs, tapes, shoes ...

But some of them get jobs because they need to pay for their books, phone bills, lunches, transportation and also for their tuition in order to go to the school of their choice.

Teenagers normally take jobs that require neither a lot of thinking nor physical skills. They work simply for the paycheck. They consider that working is a learning experience.

There are job opportunities for teenagers and they are as competitive as they are for adults. Usually, the most qualified get the job. So, it is important for young people to gain skill and knowledge through school before getting a job.



• Keep In Mind:

We use **either**...**or**... to make a **choice**

eg: They will spend the evening <u>either</u> a the theatre <u>or</u> at the cinema. I will camp <u>either</u> on the beach <u>or</u> in the forest.

We use <u>neither</u>...<u>nor</u>... to join two negative statements.

eg: I don't practise basket-ball. I don't practise volley-ball. I practise <u>neither</u> basket-ball <u>nor</u> volley-ball.

Ken didn't phone me. Stan didn't phone me. **Neither** Ken **nor** Stan phoned me.

Notice that when we use **<u>neither</u>**...**<u>nor</u>**..., the verb is affirmative.
